# Independent Auditor's Report

The Board of Directors

We have audited the accompanying balance sheets of REACT International, Inc., as of December 31, 1991 and 1990, and the related statements of activity and changes in financial position for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Company's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material aspects, the financial position of REACT INTERNATIONAL, INC., at December 31, 1991 and 1990, and the results of its operation and the changes in its financial position for the years then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The statement of activity - actual vs budget presented in this report, for the purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. # REACT International, Inc. Notes To Financial Statements December 31, 1991 and 1990

# 1. DESCRIPTION OF OPERA-TIONS AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The Corporation is a nonprofit organization formed to develop and promote the use of the Citizens Radio Service and other personal radio services as an additional source of communication for emergencies, disasters, and other forms of aid to citizens. REACT is exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3).

a) Investments

Investments at December 31, 1991 consisted of \$50,000 in certificates of deposit and \$6,299 in a money maximizer account. The December 31, 1990 balance was \$50,000, and \$16,203, respectively.

b) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of actual cost or market using the first-in, first-out basis of cost accumulation.

- c) Property and Equipment
  Property and equipment is
  records at cost with the exception that donated equipment is
  recorded at its estimated fair
  market value at the time of
  donation. Depreciation is
  provided over the estimated
  useful lives of the related assets,
  generally three to five years, and
  is calculated using the straightline method.
- d) Deferred Income Dues Income from dues is being recognized in the year in which it relates. Income received, which pertains to the subsequent year, is credited to the liability ac-

e) Deferred Life Memberships
Since the inception of the life
membership program, in 1980,
\$74,453 has been received. The
life membership dues are deferred over 20 years and allows
an individual to be a member for
his or her life without further
dues. There is no obligation on
REACTINTERNATIONAL,
INC., to refund this money upon
termination of the organization.

2. LEASE COMMITMENTS:

Capital lease on copier
On September 4, 1990, the
Company entered into a lease to
purchase a copier for \$6,125.
The lease was for one year with
monthly payments of \$557.38,
and a \$1 buy-out at the end of
the lease. The obligation at
December 31, 1990 was \$3,657.

Lease agreements for office space

On October 1, 1991, the Corporation renewed the existing lease agreement with respect to its Wichita, Kansas office for an additional eighteen months. The term calls for the Company to pay monthly installments of \$550.

# 3. DATA PROCESSING:

Data processing expenses include services for membership processing, label production and membership card printing.

# 4. BOARD OF DIRECTORS EXPENSE:

Board of Directors expenses include telephone conferences, expenses incurred in electing board members, travel and expenses for members to attend Board of Directors meetings and the annual convention.

#### 5.INSURANCE

The insurance excess account reflects money in excess of membership liability insurance and bonding which REACT International, Inc., has collected. The excess will be used to decrease the membership liability insurance and bonding when the board deems appropriate.

# 6. DONATED EQUIPMENT:

During 1991, a PageMaker software was donated to the Company with a fair market value of \$500. The amount is reflected in contributions, as revenue, and equipment, as an asset.

# 7. OBSOLETE INVENTORY

The Company decided that a public relations guide and a CB handbook was obsolete during 1991 and the value of \$720 was recorded as a loss due to obsolete inventory.

# 8. COMPENSATED ABSENCES

Employees accumulate vacation leave benefits at the rate of one week for the first year and two weeks thereafter. Accumulated earned vacation leave at December 31, 1991 amount to \$976. The liability for compensated absences has been recorded as an accrued liability in accordance with FASB Statement 43.

# 30TH ANNIVERSARY COMMEMORATIVE POSTMARK

MUST include a COMPLETE self-addressed

has submitted the art work to the U.S. Postal Service for a Special 4 Day Cancellation in Anderson, Indiana July 20, 21, 22 and 23 during our 30th Anniversary Celebration and Convention.

A special thanks goes to Mr. Paul Eschbacher, Anderson Postmaster, for his support and cooperation of this project. A Postal Service sub-station will be on location at the Convention hotel each day of the cancellation availability. In addition to cancellation of outgoing mail and envelopes for keepsakes, the Postal Service will provide a printed commemorative folder which will have a logo imprint on the front, a stamp for cancellation (stamp yet to be determined) on the inside and a brief printed description of the REACT organization.

Those attending the Convention will be able to obtain as many of the cancellations on outgoing mail, commemorative folders and keepsake envelopes as they desire at the Postal Service sub-station on site at the Convention hotel. Those of you desiring to have an envelope mailed back to you or to someone else may do so by following the information outlined below.

Your "Mail To" address must include - full name, address, city, state and correct zip code.

EACH envelope must contain your COMPLETED, zip coded RETURN address.

Requests can be made for mailings to Canada and foreign countries as long as YOU affix the proper FIRST CLASS or AIRMAIL postage. (It is suggested that you use as small as possible stamp so that as much as possible of the special cancellation will be readable).

Place your stamp(s) in the upper right hand corner. DO NOT put anything in the block of space measuring 2 1/2 inches down from the top edge of the envelope and measuring 5 inches from the right side of the envelope other than your stamp(s). This area MUST be left clear for the large cancellation stamp. It is therefore suggested that you submit only the 4" by 9 1/2" envelopes and for the "mail to" and return address use a typewriter.

This special cancellation will have the date within it changed on each of the 4 days, thus making each cancellation different. Those members desiring a cancellation of more than one date, should write in the upper right hand corner ON THE BACK of each envelope the date (20,21,22,23) that you want each enveloped canceled. Using pencil marking would allow for removal when returned to you.

A BRIEF note that outlines your cancellation requests should be included. A thank you for providing the special cancellation and handling your request for actual cancellation would be in order.

All envelopes for cancellation should be sent in an outer envelope and addressed to:

If you prefer to have your keepsakes mailed back to you in an envelope rather than through the actual mail service, you envelope. This envelope must be large enough to hold your canceled envelopes and with SUFFICIENT POSTAGE affixed.

Your request must be RE-CEIVED by the Postmaster BEFORE the date of cancellation to insure proper handling of your request. ERRORS in SUBMISSIONS CANNOT AND WILL NOT BE RETURNED. Be sure the addresses are correct and proper postage is affixed to all envelopes, including any that will return cancellations to you. Be sure to check that you have affixed sufficient postage for the size and weight of your returning envelope.

The special Commemorative Cancellation folders may be obtained by request through the Convention Committee. The folders can be ordered in quantities of 2 and multiples thereof. # REACT Teams Unite During Texas Floods

When the Southeast Texas floods hit Brazoria County. Texas in late December and early January; Brazoria County REACT#2988 and Houston Metro Emergency REACT #4098 became an active part in the disaster relief of the high waters with 23 people working as American Red Cross volunteers. Brazoria County had three waterways that rose above flood stage. They were the Brazos River, Oyster Creek and Bastrop Bayou. There were about 600 homes that were affected by the high water. Two shelters were opened in Angleton by the Brazoria County Chapter of the American Red Cross, These 2 shelters housed approximately 150 people from the affected

Emma Stanford of Brazoria County REACT was the supervisor of the shelters for the Red Cross. Jeanette McDonald of Brazoria County REACT worked as a shelter volunteer for the Red Cross. My job assignment as a member of Brazoria County REACT was to coordinate the damage assessment for the Red Cross. Philip Eakin of Brazoria County REACT, Ed Williford, Jason Asbhar and Dennis Gray of Houston Metro Emergency REACT assisted with the damage assessment. John Stanford of Brazoria County REACT was the supervisor of mass care and supply for the Red Cross. Keith McDonald of Brazoria County REACT, Billy Harper and Eric Morrical of Houston Metro Emergency REACT assisted with rnass feeding in the field from the ERV's. Dick Wood of Houston Metro Emergency REACT was delivering clean-up kits to the affected areas.

The Red Cross set up a warehouse at the Brazoria County Fairgrounds to store and disperse disaster relief goods in a more timely manner. Marty Miles, David Dearinger, Reba Harper, Glen Iris, Lynn Iris, Bill Morrical and Linda Morrical of Houston Metro Emergency REACT assisted as Red Cross volunteers in the warehouse. David Gregory of Brazoria County REACT taught a damage assessment course as a Red Cross instructor. Becky Mayfield of Brazoria County REACT assisted as a family services caseworker for the Red Cross, Cliff Tubb of Brazoria County REACT and

Robert Beran of Houston Metro Emergency REACT assisted with the relief operations as radio operators at the Chapter office.

In almost every phase of the relief operation, GMRS was used. Brazoria County REACT and Houston Metro Emergency REACT have repeaters on .600 in Angleton and .725 in Houston. With the Brazoria County Chapter of the American Red Cross having a .600 license, the chapter office, shelters, family services, mass care, supply and damage assessment, The .725 repeater was used for damage assessment in the northern part of the county. The American Red Cross system on 47,420 was used to communicate to the ERV's in the field while they were mass feeding. The duration of the relief operation lasted approximately three weeks. Brazoria County REACT also furnished outside lighting for the shelters and radio equipment fortheiruse.

The GMRS Training package is nearly done and by the time this magazine comes out those who have ordered it will have received it. I want to apologize for the extreme delay, but I ran into some problems that blocked the expected progress by at least six months. I think now that these problems have been brought to light they will not be able to retard any of the future training packages. The process to proofread the material has gone smoothly and I think everyone will agree that this package will have been worth the wait. I know I learned a lot about GMRS just by typing and editing the information.

I want to thank the many REACT newsletters that have supported the training program with their articles. And the letters to the office with suggestions for future subjects are greatly appreciated.

For those who would like to know what they'll be getting with the GMRS training package, I'll outline what it includes. It starts with the 24 page booklet that explains the terms that are used with GMRS and has sections on the FCC rules and regulations and what they mean. There are two sample applications with explanations and information about purchasing equipment. Along with this is a separate smaller book of the FCC Rules and Regulations Part 95, subpart A, that deals with the General Mobile Radio Service. To get this information from the FCC directly means you'd have to buy the whole book of rules and I believe it runs over \$20.00. You will also get a list of all the FCC field offices and a blank Form 574 license application. Finally, there will be a sheet of test

A special feature story that was published by the Orange County Register newspaper on June 22, 1991, best describes Mr. Branin's accomplishments. "This man, despite his handicaps (to which he feels is nothing more than ...'a set back...') is more than remark-

able: he is an inspiration to all of the other Teams in the area and his dedication and love for radios creates a desire in others to enlist his help and many do work closely with him."

TEAM-Champaign County
REACT, Inc.,#4517, Urbana,
Ohio was active helping within
their own community during
1991. The team president was
contacted by the Human Relations Division of the Welfare
Department for Team assistance
with a Woodstock family whom
had a very ill small child. Team
#4517 responded with not only a
Citizen's Band radio for the
parents, but also a radio and
antenna for the Grandmother of
the child.

Champaign County REACT did not stop there, Team officers made several telephone calls to additional government agencies for support. A happy ending came after raising the money to pay off the telephone bills of the family. A telephone was then installed for 911 calls when the child became ill.

This is a very unusual Team effort using CB's as well as community and other agency support. It shows what a Team can do in any emergency.

# The Supreme Sacrifice

Twenty years ago the first REACTers to make the supreme sacrifice were killed in the line of duty by a flood that ravaged Rapid City, South Carolina.

Herb and Phyllis Whiting,
Marv Pepper and Blake
Thornton of Black Hills REACT
#C276, and Otis Matthews of
Rushmore REACT#2158 were
"engaged in emergency volunteer communications" when they
died June 9, 1972, according to
an account in The National
REACTer of May/June 1972.

More than 40 units from the Black Hills and Rushmore teams as well as Northern Hills REACT#C072 responded to a call for volunteers from the sheriff's office. They were given strategic and dangerous assignments, including the establishment of a mobile command post at the Rapid City courthouse.

Most of the REACT casualties were in the Black Hawk section of the city, The National REACTer said. Others came close to dying, including a Black Hills REACTer named Dennis Smith who spent five hours clinging to the top of a tree, the newspaper said.

The flood claimed more than

215 lives and caused \$100 million in property damage, including the loss of 150 businesses and the destruction of thousands of motor vehicles.

"Rapid City citizens are grateful to the many organizations that assisted during and after the disaster," including members of Mile High REACT #2024 from distant Denver, Colorado," The National REACTer said. "Due to their quick action, countless lives were saved."

Editor's note: Even though the above REACT Teams are no longer in existence, we should all remember the sacrifice the members of those Teams made while helping their neighbors during a disaster.

To all REACT Teams and members, please be careful during disaster responses, REACT needs you as do the thousands of individuals you help.

At one accident the Team had EMS and the Highway Patrol dispatched within 30 seconds of an accident occurring on Highway I-95. Later members were told that their fast response made the difference between life and death for one of the injured.

# **High Country REACT Builds Bridges With Exercises**

Members of High Country REACT Team #4817 sharpened their response skills in four exercises during a five week period. Each exercise involved other agencies, helping to build the Team's credibility as disaster responders.

On October 16th, Team members Walter Green and Lindsey Green represented REACT in a table top exercise hosted by the Colorado Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (COVOAD) in Estes Park, Colorado. FEMA, Colorado Division of Disaster Emergency Services, Red Cross, Salvation Army, religious service

effective in handling large amounts of data quickly. The exercise involved El Paso County Disaster Services. the Red Cross and the Fountain Fire and Police Departments. Team members Willie Moore, Grey Lacerte, Lindy Green, Jeff Bosket and Walter Green provided communications.

On the 19th of

November the Team participated in a table top disaster exercise with the staff of the Pikes Peak Chapter of the Red Cross and El Paso County Disaster Services. The scenario was a major two bus accident on a narrow mountain highway in snowy conditions in El Paso County. Team

> member Walter Green simulated the Team for the exercise.

On November 23rd, the Team supported the Black Forest Composite Squadron of Civil Air Patrol in a search and rescue training exercise. The field exercise was a search

for a missing aircraft, followed by rescue and evacuation of the plane's occupants. Team members Grey Lacerte, Willie Moore and Walter Green provided communications and an on scene commander.

In only one of these four exercises was REACT the host. The key to the Team's involvement in the others was active participation in the hosting organization, in the case of COVOAD, and memorandums of agreement with the hosting agencies (Red Cross and CAP). Team members used the exercises to improve their techniques, give members experience in working with the other agencies, and gain credibility as responders. As a result the Team will be better prepared when the "big one" strikes.

# Team Events

Reli REACT, Inc.,#4552, Levittown, New York is pleased to report that they set new team records in 1991 for both mobile patrol, monitoring CB Radio Channel 9 and the General Mobile Radio Service frequencies from its members home bases.

Their mobile units reported traveling 132,492 miles during 3,965 hours and reporting or assisting in 580 incidents. Calls were handled by members in Nassau, Suffolk, Westchester, New York City and New Jersey. Base units on the Team monitored their radios more than 18,700 hours and handled over 1,100 calls for assistance.

In addition to the emergency communication assistance that REACT is known for, the team also provided communication control at events run by Cerebral Palsy, Muscular Dystrophy and the Long Island Association for Aids Care. Assistance was further given to the town of North Hempstead with traffic control at their annual Memorial Day fireworks show at Barr Beach.
