The Future of REACT

One of the problems that faces us in the next few years is the ever shrinking membership. To me this is the greatest problem facing us today. Most of us have stood by and waited for International to do something to fix the membership problem. All of our teams are too different in their service to their communities for a general publicity from International. This is where the field director can be the best source of aid to the Teams under his direction.

Most Teams know their own strengths in their communities buy may lack the ability to know how to go about selling themselves in their area. This is where the field director can be of help in teaching and showing the teams how to advertise themselves locally. We all can benefit from the knowledge gained from this by sharing what works for one team with the other teams. To accomplish this the field direct must be in close contact with all the teams under this direction. All to often we leave the task of getting new members to word of mouth. This has not been enough in the past and will not be enough

for us to grow in the future. Last year our team took a simple idea of a brochure and placed them in the local Radio Shacks. We have been able to bring 8 new members into our team. That is a 25% increase in our membership. If all of our teams could do this, we would not have required the last dues increase. CB's will always be an important tool in our approach to selling ourselves. There are those that say that CB is a dying form of communications. As long as there are those out there that are using CB, we will be there to help them. We must also realize that we as teams can not sit back and ignore the every growing presence of Cellular phones. Cellular can be a way we can add another tool to use. Not just the use of Cellular but the training of the use of this new form to communicate the this needs. 911 with a cellular has its own set of problems. We have experts in every form of wireless communications on our membership. We need to make sure this information gets to the teams that don't have the experts close at hand.

I am sure that I alone can't solve the problems we face, but I am certain that with the help of all of you we can turn our declining membership and bring our organization back to the status we once had.

In Memory of

Vincent J. Kern

(REACT International #C109-00019) (b. 6 Feb. 1934 d. 2 Sept. 1994)

Vincent J. Kern, a resident of Woodbridge, Virginia for 14 years and a member of Prince William REACT, Inc. for over 11 years, died while doing whathe loved-being a REACTer. While seating up for his Team's Labor Day Coffee Safety Break on September 2, 1994, Vince suffered a fatal heart attack.

Vince served in the United States Marines Corps for 30 years, retiring as a Master Gunnery Sergeant. During the course of his military service, he was awarded the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal; National Defense Service Medal; Letter of Appreciation Meritorious Mast (2); Viet Nam Service Medal; Good Conduct Medal; Navy Unit Citation; Republic of Viet Nam Meritorious Unit Commendation Medal; Meritorious Service Medal; and Sharp Shooter Pistol Badge. He was then employed with GANT Travel Management in Washington, D.C., Quantico Marine Base, in Downey, California. Retiring a second time, he became a REACTer for 24 hours a day, instead of his usual 16 hours a day.

He was dedicated and energetic in public service, working at local, state, and national levels to provide communications services and aid through CB and other emergency radio systems. He was a Member of Prince William RE-ACT, Inc. #C109 and REACT International since 1983, President of Prince William REACT from 1984-1989. He

served the Commonwealth of Virginia REACT Council, Inc. as a Board of Directors member for 6 years: Northern Virginia District Director, Treasurer, Vice President, and President. Recently, he was elected to REACT International's Board of Directors as Secretary/Treasurer. Vince devoted literally tens of thousands of hours to his Channel 9 emergency monitoring, and directly helped thousands of the motoring public, members of the local communities and members of REACT worldwide.

Vince is survived by his wife, Peggy, a son, 2 stepsons, 6 sisters and 2 brothers.

His loss will be long felt by all Members of REACT, most particularly by Prince William REACT and the Commonwealth of Virginia REACT Council.

Editors Note: I spoke with Vince on Thursday, September 1st, while he was preparing for Team #C109's Labor Day Coffee Break. Vince displayed great excitement in working this event, as all REACT events with his fellow members and in helping travellers. And since the Convention, Vince had shown great enthusiasm in his new role as a Field Director. Ifor one, know he would have made an exceptional director, if he was only given the opportunity. Vince, you will be missed by all.





Field Director Nomination and Election

The 1994 Election Committee met on July 16th for the purpose of counting the ballots for Field Director. Those counting the ballots were Jacki MacDonald, Field Director, Greg Seemuth, At-Large Director, Al Hanger from Virginia, Don Perry from Oregon, Azella Tingler from Virginia and Ned Smith from Pennsylvania. The four

candidates, Jim Bear, Dick Gamble, Ken Green and Vince Kern were invited to witness the counting of the ballots.

There were 186 ballots received at the time the ballots were picked up on the morning of July 16th. Of these there were nine spoiled ballots. All spoiled ballots had incorrect information on the ballot envelope. Three ballots were received late and were not counted.

The results of the election were 96 votes for Ken Green, 91 votes for Jim Bear, 81 votes for Vince Kern and 71 votes for Dick Gamble. There was also one abstention. The vote count and results were posted at the hotel immediately following the ballot counting. The ballots received are listed in their entirety on page 9.

The Great Nipple Peak Range Fire

San Angelo REACT, Inc. #3387, San Angelo, Texas received a call on GMRS from a station located in Coke County at the fire scene that the REACT command post was needed for communications. The call came at 5:00 p.m. and the come center, manned by four REACTers went 10-8 at 5:30 p.m. This is not the first time that we had been called to help on this type of disaster and usually its a few hours or one day maximum. This was not to be the case this time. We went into the field on June 28th and worked the fire communications until July 3rd at approximately 10:00 p.m., when the comm center returned to our building. During this disaster we had 15 members of SARI working, with a total of 225 man hours expended.

This was the first time in several years that our resources had really been stressed. We had members that worked the radio consoles all night, were relieved and went back to San Angelo some 30 miles away, cleaned up and went to their regular job.

This was the first time that we had worked with the TFS and they could have not been nicer and were so appreciative of the opportunity to work in a command post such as ours. They had a hard time believing that we furnished this at no cost. I'm sure that we as well as other teams in the state will be called on by this agency for help. What a way to finish June and start July!

Now as to what we did ...

- 1. Provided the command post for the Texas Forrest Service.
- Handled all communications for fire, TFS, U.S. Customs (air to ground) Coke County Sheriff Office (fire scene).
- 3. Worked partial communication for Salvation Army.
- 4. Handled some amateur traffic.
- Provided cellular phone for reporting and resource gathering.
- Provided lights for staging area and electricity for several other uses.
- Provided mobile generator.
- Helped with fueling of several pieces of equipment.

REACT Speaker's Packet

Does everyone in your area know what REACT is or what your Team does? Do you have someone from your Team attending the meetings of your local clubs and public service groups and giving presentations? Are most of your members willing to become the Team's public speaker? Is the Community you service throwing unlimited funds your way?

If you answered No to any of those questions, it's now been made a little easier to do that needed REACT presentation.

The Training & Development Committee has produced overhead slides that explain just what REACT does. You will get a script that does with the slides, informing the speaker when to change the slide and giving helpful hints to customize the talk to your circumstances. There is also a short booklet describing the best ways to set up the room for the talk and methods to make it interesting for your audience.

There are two styles that are available. If you wish to have the transparencies made locally, but the "paper slide packet". This packet is less expensive, but involves more preparation before it is ready for a presentation. The paper slides are to be used to copy onto overhead transparency film. Take the paper slides to an office supply store or print shop and ask to have them made into transparencies. This packet costs \$5.00 with shipping.

The second style is the "transparency packet". Here the REACT office staff will print the slides on transparency film, with an eve-catching color border. and you will be ready to do your first presentation as soon as the package arrives in the mail. You only need to write into your speech facts that pertain specifically to your Team or Council. This packet costs \$10.00 with shipping.

You will receive 8 slides, 10 pages of script and a 6 page booklet of helpful

speaking tips. The slides cover subjects such as the 501(c)(3) IRS status - RE-ACT's voluntary, non-profit, public service objectives - association with VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters) - REACT's President's Volunteer Award - and the valuable community resource REACT is and the many worthy programs REACT Teams initiate.

This presentation can be used for all kinds of talks, from public awareness, to membership recruitment, to fund raising. You only need to modify what you say while the last slide is being shown on the screen. Want to add some extra pizzazz? Take snapshots of your Team in action and have them enlarged and copied onto transparency film too.

Once you have the basic "REACT Speaker's Packet" and add to it what makes your Team or Council unique, you will be well equipped to do a superior presentation.

Now, if only we could come up with a cure for "Stage Fright"!!!

REACT INTERNATIONAL, INC. APPLICATION FOR LIFE MEMBERSHIP

Life Membership

Here are the requirements for membership in this prestigious REACT group.

REACT Team members who after a minimum of two (2) years of participation and service wish to demonstrate their dedication and support for the ideals and objectives of the REACT program have the opportunity to become Life Members in REACT International. Life Membership has been established as a special class of membership in REACT International, Inc. An applicant for Life Membership must have been an active REACT Team Member for two (2) years or more. The applicant must be recommended by his Team and must submit Life Member Dues equal to twenty-five (25) times the current Regular Membership dues that apply at the time of application. Life Members will have all the rights and privileges granted to the Regular Membership category.

Several key policy interpretations should be noted with regard to Life Membership in *REACT*.

- 1. The Life Member must meet all Team membership requirements (duties) to remain an active member of his or her local **REACT** Team or when transferring to another Team. The Life Member must pay local Team dues (if such are required) but is granted free membership in **REACT** International for life.
- 2. The individual's recognition as a Life Member in no way is in conflict or contradiction of the concept that **REACT** Membership is primarily through membership in a local **REACT** Team.
- 3. A Life Member is supportive of all concepts of the **REACT** program including the desirability of membership only through affiliation with a local REACT Team.
- 4. In those situations where an individual Life Member is located where a Team is not active, or becomes geographically separated from his or her *REACT* Team for whatever reason, in keeping with the goals and ideals embodied in Life Membership, he or she is to try to become affiliated with the appropriate local Team. Or where no local Team exists, to organize a new Team in fulfillment of his or her dedication to the ideals of *REACT*.
- 5. Life Membership in *REACT* International shall not prohibit the individual from participating as a member in more than one *REACT* Team should such membership be acceptable to the Teams concerned. Payment of additional *REACT* International dues should not be required for this purpose. However, the computer record and membership

card for the Life Member shall be issued through only one *REACT* Team. Furthermore, multiple membership in more than one *REACT* Team shall not be utilized to give more than one Team vote at *REACT* Team Council meetings or meetings of *REACT* International, Inc. No individual regardless of their multiple affiliation shall be entitled to more than one vote at any *REACT* meeting.

- 6. A Life Member, who, for whatever reason, is not a member of a *REACT* Team may monitor the Emergency Channel as a *REACT* monitor. However, a Life Member must be interfere in any way with the operations or activities of officially chartered *REACT* Teams. The Life Member must realize that the local *REACT* Team is the basic entity in the *REACT* organization. The Life Membership should also realize that *REACT* was founded on the Team concept and that its strength lies in adhering to the principle of local Teams meeting local needs.
- 7. Life Members may participate in Council activities only as official Delegates of their Team or under conditions that Councils of Teams may decide.
- 8. Life Members will be issued Life Member numbers in ascending order according to the date of receipt of Life Member application and dues.
- 9. Even though an individual has been recognized and identified as a Life Member of *REACT*, that membership may be revoked for cause should that individual bring discredit upon the *REACT* name.
- 10. One objective of Life Membership is to develop a form of obtainable recognition for all *REACT* members who have the dedication and devotion to the *REACT* objectives and ideals. Life Membership functions at *REACT* International Conventions, State Council meetings and other broad gatherings of REACT membership shall bring credit upon this group and a recognition of their achievement.
- 11. The use of Life Memberships as Council or Team awards for long and dedicated service is encouraged. The presentation of Life Membership to Past Presidents or key leaders who are moving out of the area would recognize their past efforts on behalf of the Team and would also serve to encourage continued participation in the **REACT** program by the new Life Member wherever he or she may go.

According to an article on page 23 of the QST magazine, July 1994, we are nearing the end of Sunspot Cycle 22, and Cycle 23 may begin in early 1996. This is "good news and bad news" for legitimate CB users.

The end of a sunspot cycle and beginning of a new one, as measured by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Space Environmental Service Center, is the low point in sunspot activity. This low activity is bad news for amateur radio operators, who depend on sunspots to increase ionization of the upper atmosphere and promote long-distance skywave communications. Licensed amateurs look forward to the increased DX communications possible during the peak of the next sunspot cycle, while griping about the current poor conditions.

The current poor conditions for hams are good conditions for legal CB operators. Less skip on our 11-meter band means less interference with legitimate local communications. Reading the QST article in that context, we have until about 1997 to enjoy the current low levels of skip before the next wave of really bad interference rolls in. For those of you who haven't been around long enough to remember, the last peak (actually more like a mesa) was from about 1989 to 1992. The average cycle is about 11 years.



I am 88 years old and severely disabled by asthma and arthritis and live on a small social security income.

Last winter, February 8th, I had a very severe attack of asthma and the two inhalers and the nebular I use did not help and my portable oxygen bottle went dry. I have a 23 channel Lafayette Telset 1023 base in my bedroom. Having no phone, in desperation I managed to get to the base and turned it on and began calling for help on both Channel 9 and 19. In only about 2 minutes I had someone answer and between gasps I was able to give them directions to my house. In approximately 5 minutes the Wallhill Volunteer Ambulance Corp. arrived, got me on oxygen and transported me to the hospital where I was diagnosed as having pneumonia and spent 3 weeks there.

I was never able to find out who saved my life by answer my CB call for help. I surely would have died that night without that call being answered. The only activity I am able to engage in is in using and listening to my CB. About 2 weeks a go my CB gave up the ghost. I have no knowledge of electronics but have a continuity tester and a Micronte 22-201V test meter. I checked everything possible that I could and the result was that I knew as much about what was wrong with it now as before I started. I have tried to find someone locally who might be able to repair it if possible, but have been unsuccessful and I do not have the means to buy another one. Do you by any chance know of someone who is a member of REACT who might be able to tell me what is wrong with it...or repair it for me? I would mean a great deal to me. As it operates on both 100 or 12 volts. I was able to take it with me in my pickup when I went to the doctor or after groceries because I am afraid of needing help on the road and would not be able to get any without the CB.

I would also like information on how to become a REACT member as I enjoy listening to the CB radio and have been able to get help to several people at various times because of accidents and illnesses. I know what it means to need help and be able to get it.
