From the President

I Can't Get It For You Wholesale, but...

ditor DeLuca is a stern taskmaster; he in sists that I send my regular column *now!*It occurs to me that there are a number of useful items available from *REACT* International and that a mention of some of them might be helpful.

The *REACT* Emergency Communications Training Course was featured in the March-April 2003 *REACTer* (page 5), so I'll just mention it here. It's a great course, and I think every *REACTer* would benefit from completing it. For more information, inquire by sending a message to < training@reactintl.org > .

The *REACT* store has several relatively new items. The new *REACT* cap is available in both summer (mesh back) and winter (solid) versions. It's solid black, sturdily made in the USA, and has the standard *REACT* patch affixed to the front. The cap goes well with any uniform, and looks good when worn out of uniform. They're \$7 each plus shipping.

Also available are the *REACT* bumper sticker (which features the new toll-free membership inquiry number 1-877-REACT99) and the newly redesigned *REACT* trash bag. Both of these items are great for PR and are available in quantity at reasonable prices.

We're currently obtaining two new items. First is the "Volunteer Communications" flash which can be worn immediately below the standard *RE-ACT* patch or elsewhere on a uniform. It will be the same width as the standard patch, about one inch high, and will come in two versions. One will match the standard *REACT* patch (orange border, white background, black letters), and the other will have a black border and letters, with a lime green background.

The second new item is a "Junior Division" flash, designed to be worn directly below a standard patch, and in matching colors. Using this flash will permit a Junior *REACT*er to "graduate" from junior to regular status simply by removing the flash.

Both of these new items should be available at the 2003 *REACT* Convention in Evansville.

We also still have a plentiful supply of peeland-stick 40th Anniversary stickers. These are in three sizes and are very inexpensive. Though the 40th Anniversary year has passed, they are still great for PR. I use one on virtually every letter I send out.

All of the *REACT* store items are available through the Suitland office. Send an Email to < react@reactintl.org > to inquire about pricing and to order.

A great place to find out about *REACT* is the official web site at <www.reactintl.org>. If you haven't thoroughly explored the site, or haven't visited recently, you should do so. You can find recent issues of *the REACTer*, the new "Planning Safe Community Events" handbook (written by Stuart DeLuca), and Bob Leef's booklet "*REACT* Radio Systems." All of this is available for download at no charge!

In addition, on the web site you can find contact information for *REACT*'s Teams and councils, RI officers and Directors, and committees and liaisons. There's a wealth of information there, and it's kept pretty well updated. If your Team has its own web site, be sure to provide a link to the RI site (and be sure to tell the Communications Committee about the link!)

Regional Director Elections

Each year, three Regional Directors of REACT International are elected to serve three year terms. This year, Teams in Regions 1, 4, and 7 will elect Directors. These candidates have been nominated for the three offices.

Region 1

Fred J. Lanshe is the incumbent Region 1 Director, and is a candidate for another term. Fred has been the only Region 1 Director since the restructuring of RI in 1998. In 2001, Fred resigned due to health problems; when his health improved, the Board reappointed him to the office, which had remained vacant.

Fred is retired and single. His educational background includes an associate degree in electronics and a variety of courses in Web design and technology; he attended college for three years.

The reasons I feel I wish to run for the *REACT* International, Inc., Board are as follows:



Region 7

Robert L. Kaster of Oklahoma City is the incumbent Region 7 Director and is seeking re-election. Bob was appointed to the office in 2001 when Lee Besing, having been elected Secretary and Treasurer of *REACT* International, resigned as Regional Director. Bob is seeking his first full term in the office.

Bob is married and has three grown children; he is retired from government service. His educational background includes a variety of technical and administrative courses taken while working for the government.

He has been a member of Oklahoma County (Okla.) *REACT* since 1984 and has been the Team's president since 1986. He has served as Public Relations Liaison for *REACT* International since 2001, and chaired the Disaster Response Procedures Committee last year. He is a licensed Amateur and GMRS radio operator.

From the Executive Vice-President

Recently I saw a bumper sticker that really made me stop and think. The bumper sticker phrase was "Be a participant — The world is run by those who show up." Wow!!!! What a powerful statement.

REACT is only one organization that is affected by this phrase. For instance, think of a REACT Team. On one hand, you may be one of the participants who shows up at Team meetings and helps to make Team decisions. On the other hand, you may be a member that doesn't participate in Team meetings. Through regular lack of participation, you may be giving up some of your rights in the decision-making process of the Team, therefore its future success. This participation issue doesn't only apply to Team meetings, but also to Team events and other Team functions and activities. Member participation in all aspects is one of the keys to the success or failure of any Team.

Participation also extends to *REACT* Councils and *REACT* International. All levels of *REACT* need good active participants, especially as directors, officers and other leaders. This is especially true for *REACT* International (RI). RI has nine regional directors – eight in the United States plus a director for Canada and other countries outside of the United States. Regional directors, along with the officers, comprise the RI Board of Directors. Three of the regions hold nominations

and elections each year in rotation. During the entire history of the regional director structure, there has always been a shortage of *REACT* members who will consider being nominated and possibly elected to the RI board of directors.

While the reasons for non-participation as a regional director are varied, perhaps some members don't want to be associated with the board because of bad feelings about previous boards. Since 1998, when RI was reorganized and the Regional Directors were first elected, the RI Board has been very responsive to members' needs and has made decisions accordingly when possible. I am proud to be a current member of the RI Board of Directors that has stopped the drastic decline in membership, created a better working structure and established better relations between *REACT* International and the members. You might say that I am a good example of the phrase: "Be a participant — The world is run by those who show up."

Only you can answer whether you are a participant or not. If you are, that's good. If you aren't, then you should get more active in your Team, Council or *REACT* International. If you have any questions about what it takes to be an officer or director, you can contact any of the RI Board members or *REACT* officers to get their opinions. Remember: If you want to help run the world, you have to show up first.

Experience Hoosier Hospitality

Start packing your suitcase and your radios and get ready to head to Evansville, Indiana, for the 2003 *REACT* International Convention.

Final Convention schedules will be updated on the Web site, < www.reactintl.org/conventions/2003 > , as the time approaches closer, but we are happy to announce that we expect a fun and information-packed schedule that will keep your head spinning and your notepads full. The Web site will have more detailed and updated information available on all topics covered in this article.

If you still need another reason to attend this year's convention, take a look at the Convention logo on the front cover of the REACTer (or the Web site) to see how the official T-shirt will look this year. This design was created by Patty with CHIP Shirts

of Ft. Branch, Ind. (www. chipshirts.com) and will appear on the back of the official Convention shirt and other materials. The comment has been made that it would be worth attending the Convention just to get the T-shirt, but that might be a slight exaggeration.

The Convention's Hospitality Room will be open Monday, July 21, through Thursday, July 24. Convention Operations will be monitoring GMRS 462.675 MHz (PL 141.3), CB-9, and Amateur repeater 146.79 MHz from the hotel and area base locations.

While the official Convention won't start until Tuesday, July 22, we have some unofficial, pre-convention events for those of you who arrive early. Here is a brief summary of just a few of the activities and workshops we have arranged for you:

On **Monday, July 21**, while the Board is busily meeting (open to all members), we will experience a presentation and tour of the

Landing Ship—Tank (LST 325). The LST was an ocean-going ship with unique design features that allowed it to beach itself, unload cargo, then retract itself. The ship had a flat bottom that helped facilitate beach landings, but provided a rough ride for her crew and passengers. The ship was also designed with several void spaces on her lowermost deck that could be flooded while at sea to provide extra ballast, then evacuated to allow the ship to ride



higher and sail unto the beach. This ship will be docked at the Evansville river front for a couple of weeks, departing near the end of our convention. Evansville was the home of a shipyard that constructed LSTs during World War II.

Registration and the Hospitality Room will be open most of the day. We might even squeeze in some other workshops or training seminars, such as a practice session for those wanting to study for their Technician Amateur Radio license. Monday will conclude with an evening welcome party for the early birds, to be held in the hospitality room.

On **Tuesday**, **July 22**, the Board will continue to meet in the morning, but has promised to try and wrap it up by noon. The newcomers' reception and other meetings will be conducted in the morning while the Board is meeting, then we will all enjoy lunch followed by the official photo session at 1 pm (uniform hats are welcome) and the opening session at 2 pm to begin the official Convention.

At 3:30 pm there will be



a demonstration by the Evansville Police Department's motorcycle patrol in front of the hotel. The Evansville Police Department Motorcycle Unit was re-established on April 1, 2002, by Police Chief David W. Gulledge, after being phased out some 34 years ago. The officers assigned to this

unit operate the police motorcycles year round, in favorable weather conditions. The officers are also issued marked take-home police cars to utilize when they are unable to ride their motorcycles. The re-establishing of this unit has given the Evansville Police Department another valuable tool with which to serve the citizens of Evansville, Indiana.

Dinner will be at 6 pm followed by the river cruise at 8 pm. Cost for the Dinner and Cruise will be just \$20 (not included in registration fees). Dinner will be served on land to allow a more varied selection from the dinner menu and perhaps avoid upsetting some tender tummies who might have not enjoyed fine dining with the gentle rocking motion of the riverboat. 
