The insurance decision that the Board made was not popular among the Board members but we had to choose whether to increase the insurance to Teams/members or to have *REACT* International continue to have a very large deficit at the end of each year. Please understand that a deficit in the budget at the end of the year means that the difference must be taken from RI savings and that is never a good idea. If your eam wishes to discuss options or alternatives, please contact myself or Norman in the RI office. Remember that you have worked hard to build vour REACT Team and establish various relations. "REACT is still the best way to go let's keep it that way."

On October 22, 2005 at 3:00 pm Eastern time the RI Board of Directors conducted its first electronic Board meeting. The idea had been discussed for quite some time and it finally happened. This first e-meeting was conducted as an experiment to see if it might work for *REACT*. There was a much reduced agenda that was distributed to all officers and Directors via email in advance of the e-meeting. The software chosen for this experiment was

from Teamspeak. Teamspeak is free of charge to noncommercial users, and it is an application that enables people to speak to each other over the Internet just as you would via Among telephone. other things, there is even a text messaging feature that lets participants send a message to a specific individual(s) or the entire group. There was considerable advance preparation to help Directors and officers with the Teamspeak software setup for the meeting, etc. There were still some glitches that prevented some of the Directors and officers from participating though. Out of the possible 13 officers and Directors, 9 were able to participate in the e-meeting. All Directors and officers were invited to critique the e-meeting to see what needs to be changed next time. It is my desire that this emeeting will be an annual occurrence in addition to the Annual meeting and summer meeting.

Near the middle of October I received an email from a *REACT* friend in Indiana. Her emails are normally upbeat but this one was a real downer. She informed me of the death of Jack Murrell, long time *REACT*er active at the Team, council and international levels for many years. Jack was

76 years old and was preceded in death by his wife Edna and 1 son. He is survived by 7 children, 12 grand children, 1 great-grandson and his brother. On the *REACT* International Board of Directors, Jack held the office of president and most recently was the Director for region 4 (Indiana, Michigan and Ohio). I worked with Jack on the RI Board for only a few years, but in that time I learned that he was a very unique individual (That is a compliment.). Jack didn't say too much but when he did, you better listen because he didn't like to repeat himself. During Board meetings, Jack would like to play word games in his game book. If ever anyone should think that he wasn't paying attention to the business that was being discussed. they were making a big mistake. He heard everything that was being discussed. Many of his comments had deeper meanings than many of the Board members realized at the time. Jack's family, *REACT* and the world have truly lost a giant. Thank you Jack.

These last two years have been bad ones for hurricanes. Volunteer communicators have been kept busy responding to disaster after disaster. (REACTer Nov. -Dec. 2004 & Nov. - Dec. 2003) But has it been worse than normal? According to figures published by the National Hurricane Center (www.nhc.noaa.gov), currently we are suffering through one of the worst periods since modern record keeping began in 1851.

According to a study recently released by the National Hurricane Center, the 2005 season had 26 named storms, a record, with 13 hurricanes, also a record – seven of which became intense hurricanes. Though projections differ, many experts expect continued severe weather for at least several years, though recent projections call for decreased – though still above normal – hurricane activity.

Projections are for nine hurricanes – five intense as opposed to an average of six and two.

So, how do hurricanes form and what conditions favor their development? According to NOAA, "Convection is the process by which tropical thunderstorms. storms and hurricanes form. It is also an important ingredient of a monsoon system. When convection is strong — warm, moist and unstable air in the lower atmosphere rises to great heights. This rising air cools, forming clouds and rain. However, it remains warmer than its surrounding environment. warming the atmosphere. Warmer temperatures lead to higher pressure in the atmosphere upper and lower pressure in the lower atmosphere, which further accelerates the inflow of warm, moist air into the region, and further enhances the outflow in the upper atmosphere, thus sustaining the convection."

Hurricanes are categorized by wind speed. We turn to the National Hurricane Center for our definitions. The threshold is set at wind speeds of 74 mph. Below that level, we have tropical depression and tropical storm. Considerable damage is likely below hurricane levels, but the major damage comes with hurricanes, sometimes due to the tornados they spawn.

<u>Category 1:</u> Winds are 74-95 mph. Storm surge is 4-5 feet above normal. Damage is primarily to unanchored mobile homes, vegetation, and poorly constructed signs.

Category 2: Winds 96-110 mph. Damage will occur to buildings and some trees will be blown down. Storm surge 6-8 feet above normal is to be expected.

Category 3: Winds 111-130 mph. Storm surge 9-12 feet above normal is expected. Structural damage to small buildings will occur with mobile homes destroyed.

Category 4: Winds are in the 131-155 mph range. Storm surge is 13-18 feet above normal. Considerable damage with some roof collapse on small structures occurs. Katrina hit the Gulf coast as a category four, and note what that storm did.

<u>Category 5:</u> Winds are greater than 155 mph. Storm surge is move than 18 feet above normal. Roof collapse and some complete destruction of buildings. Damage is severe and widespread.

Hurricanes in categories three through five are

considered as major or intense hurricanes and special records are kept of their occurrence.

Hurricanes need warm ocean waters, low wind shear, and favorable midlevel easterly winds. All these conditions have been present at unusual levels since 1995. This change seems to be part of a natural cycle with 20 to 30 year periods of above or below normal hurricane activity. None of this relates to greenhouse warming, but some studies indicate that over the next century global

warming may lead to an intensification of conditions favorable to hurricane development.

With our increased vulnerability to infrastructure damage and our increasing numbers, the potential for disaster has never been higher. Lives will be lost; property will be Weaknesses in our response efforts and our preventative efforts will cost us dearly. But there is a bright side. There have never been more, or better trained, volcommunicators, unteer ready to step in when official channels become overloaded – as they generally do. That is you and me. If you haven't already done so, download the REACT preparedness emergency course and study it. If you are a ham, go through the ARRL course, either on the Internet or otherwise. Check the ARRL website http://www.arrl.org. For preparedness tips, go to http://www.nhc.noaa.gov/H AW2/english/intro.shtml

Hurricane Watch!

When hurricanes threaten, Amateur Radio operators activate the Hurricane Watch Net . If you would like to listen in, the net frequency will be 14.325 MHz, upper sideband.

Other resources to keep in mind: The Waterway Net meets daily from 0745 to 0845 Eastern Time on 7.268 MHz, lower sideband. The Maritime Mobile Service Net operates continually, with rotating Net Control Stations, every afternoon and evening on 14.300 MHz upper sideband.

- **1. Call to Order**. Meeting called to order at 3:10 p.m. EST, Saturday, 22 October 2005, by Chairman Fry. Mr. Fry first established ground rules for the first-ever RI electronic Board meeting. The limited agenda had been previously sent to each Director and officer.
- **2. Quorum.** Secretary Besing announced there was a quorum with five Directors out of eight (including the President) present. Three non-voting officers were present.
- **3. Approval of Previous Minutes**. Minutes of the meeting held 21-24 June were approved unanimously.
- **4. New** *REACT***er Editor.** Mr. Thompson presented the Editor Search Committee's recommendation that Don Tarbet of Maine be the new *REACT*er editor. He briefed the Board on Mr. Tarbet's qualifications, including that Mr. Tarbet currently edited several other publications and had a PhD. **Motion** Mr. Manlove, 2d Mr. Roberts, to appoint Don Tarbet as the new editor of *REACT*er. **Unanimous.**

5. REACTer Status. It was decided that Mr. Besing and Mr. Thompson would work on the (late) July-August and September/October issues, and will work with Mr. Tarbet on the November/December issue if he is ready to assume the position, otherwise he will start with the January/February issue. Mr. Besing announced that he would endeavor to have the Jul/Aug issue to the printer by the end of October, the Sep/Oct issue by mid-November, and the Nov/Dec issue by the end of November.

At this point, the meeting was recessed briefly because of technical difficulties with the software. When the problems were corrected, all previously present were again present.

- **6. President's Letter Concerning Insurance**. The President announced he had sent a letter to all Teams respecting the \$12.00 insurance fee since the information hadn't been included in the May/June *REACT*er.
- **7. Disaster Fund Policy.** President Cooper briefly discussed Disaster Fund policies, and asked that all officers and Directors email their suggestions to him and Mr. Thompson. An RI policy, based on these suggestions, would be prepared and sent to the Board. Mr. Besing mentioned the ARRL policy. It is desirable that the policy be sent to Teams with the annual registration in about a week, so time is of the essence.
- **8. Future E-Meetings.** President Cooper asked that officers and Directors send their observations and comments to him. He will compile and share with the Board and officers.
- **9. Annual Board Meeting 3-4 March 2006.** Chairman Fry confirmed that the Annual Meeting of the Board would begin at 8:30 a.m. on Friday, 3 March 2006. Treasurer Kaplan will send out information regarding airport and hotel accommodations.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:12 p.m. EST, sine die.

As community events go, it wasn't a real biggie. There were slightly more than 1200 registered for the first ever 5K Labor Day Walk/Run in Rancho Santa Margarita, Calif., and about 130 kids for the 1K. There were also exhibits near the start/finish area. However, behind the scenes something interesting happened.

REACT had worked before in the city, providing communications for two canyon cleanups and the annual New Year's Eve Family Fair. These activities had been without need of the police department. However, the 5K event required the

PD to do street blockades, traffic direction, spectator control, security, and other official functions. Our function was to observe and report. Because of all this activity, the city Emergency Operations Center was activated with Police and Fire Department personnel, and Crest *REACT* was asked to provide a member for liaison.

About a year before, we had asked to install a UHF antenna on the roof of the PD and make a wall outlet for the cable in case of a future need for communications services that we might provide. The 5K was to be the first use. After our portable repeater was brought in and connected, all *REACT*ers along the route were in touch with Jeff Roberts, Crest 68, who was in the EOC. What happened at this point was a surprise to the Police and Fire authorities. As Sgt. Steve Miller put it "we were getting information from *REACT* that wasn't being reported from our officers, the reserves, or the explorers!"

This was reason enough for *REACT* to be there but wait - there's more! Something else new happened. For the first time, we monitored FRS channel 1 for assistance. Our signs along the route and at the registration area said: AT THIS EVENT WE MONITOR FRS CH.1 FOR THE PUBLIC. This could be valuable at any activity where there are a lot of people and the usual questions, problems, need for directions, etc. There is a lot of potential here for REACT throughout the country to do this as yet another public communications service if participants know ahead of time to bring their FRS radios. This should be mentioned in any advance event promotion when your Team plans to do it. Reports on your results would be interesting to photos! read. And. send your

BPL IS STILL WITH US

The issue of Broad Band over Powerlines (BPL) is still with us and not likely to go away until the technology itself fails to prove the panacea proponents claim it to be. Charles Land in the January – February 2004 *REACT*er describes BPL as follows: "The basic concept of BPL is to transmit broadband signals, containing Internet data and possibly other content, over existing electrical powerlines. BPL is designed to use the spectrum from 2 to 80 Mhz. Unfortunately, these powerlines are unshielded antennas and interference with emergency and public service communications has been, and probably will continue to be, unavoidable.

The FCC finally acknowledged concerns of ARRL, *REACT* (*REACT*er July-August 2004), and other public and private concerns by requiring BPL suppliers to provide information about their operation to a data base. However, the FCC is now limiting access to that data base, unreasonably, according to ARRL. The FCC has supported the implementation of BPL. Former Chairman Michael Powell was a particularly vociferous supporter.

And, according to Land and other commentators, it isn't even as though BPL was a truly viable technology on any large scale. It would be prohibitively expensive to implement in rural areas, the very locations it is being touted as capable of solving access problems. ARRL has commented to the effect that the technology does not work well. The amazing thing, ARRL says, is that it works at all. It is like a dog walking on his hind legs. He doesn't do it well; the impressive thing is that he does it at all.
