Our country has experienced some devastating natural and man-made disasters which include flooding, fires, and storms just to name a few. For this reason, it is important to re-

new our friendships and mutual agreements with some of the other agencies and organizations who are also involved in disaster assistance. When is the last time you sat down with your counterpart at the Red Cross, Salvation Army, CERT, fire department, or law enforcement department in your community? Has it been too long? What about the National Weather Service (NWS)?

The NWS has a mutual MOU agreement with REACT. With the severe weather we have seen across the nation, you should review your spotter or SKYWARN training with a refresher, or if you have never been involved, get involved and trained. REACT Hero Award

On a spring day four members of Rainier *REACT* Radio Watch (RRRW) #3366 trekked from Auburn, Washington, through sleet, hail, rain, and snow to mile marker 72 of Interstate 5 to the CFN truck stop where they met with the Matthew R. Lovo, Sr. family.

In August of 2007 (see September-October, 2007 *REACT*er) Matt and Matty Lovo (Matty had just turned nine years old in July) were in their tractor trailer loaded with 100 tons of lumber on US Highway 30 North going through the town of St. Helens, Oregon, at about 60 mph. Due to a medical problem, Matt passed out and slumped into the seat. Matty yelled to his father to "quit playing." When his father didn't respond and the truck drifted into oncoming traffic, Matty grabbed the CB microphone and asked how he could stop his father's truck.

He was told to "turn off the key," which he did. By this time the truck was moving across four traffic lanes and one turn lane and headed toward a power pole on the opposite side of the road. Nine-year-old Matty commenced steering it back to the proper lane of traffic.

As the tractor trailer rig slowed, a motorist who had witnessed the event was able to catch up, get the driver side door open, and apply the brakes as Matty steered the truck to the shoulder of the road.

In memory of this event, the RRRW Team met with the Lovos to present Matty the framed *RE-ACT* Radio Hero Award and a Cobra 25-mile FRS radio system, and Matt Senior with a Cobra 29, 40 channel CB, in recognition of Matty's efforts in getting help by radio thereby enabling him to stop his father's truck. Through this effort the damage was held to a bit of scratched paint and a bent bottom step on the driver's side. Insignificant compared to what might have been!

Though it was a cold, windy and wet day, we all left the truck stop in good spirits and proud that we could represent *REACT* International, Inc.

There is now a policy that has been instituted by the Board to enable Teams to have the *RE-ACT*er sent to non-members at no cost for the purpose of Public Relations. As far as I am concerned this is the best thing to come along since Butter Pecan ice cream.

REACT News: Teams and Team Members

Flagler County Assist *REACT*Responds to Severe Weather in 2007

Our Team is used to SKYWARN activations, and a number of times each year we activate for a SKYWARN event. Usually activating at the direction of the National Weather Service or Emergency Management, Flagler County Assist operates a SKYWARN spotter net on GMRS in close cooperation with the ARES 2-meter net. During larger operations all reports are funneled into SKYWARN Operations a joint information point established by ARES & REACT to insure that good information is getting to the National Weather Service forecast office in Jacksonville.



But 2007 was different from the usual. It all started in February of that year when Flagler County was threatened by the infamous Groundhog Day tornadoes that ravaged Central Florida. Four times that scary night, NWS forecasters issued tornado warnings for Flagler County as strong tornado vortex signatures were detected and traveled across the area during the wee hours of

the morning. As each signature crossed the county, SKYWARN Nets were placed into full LEVEL 4, emergency mode expecting the worse. After the threat had passed it was realized that none of the rotations touched down. We were very lucky that not only did we dodge just one bullet, but all four of them.



The next morning revealed the horror that was brought upon communities to the south and west of Flagler from the tornadoes.

But we were not finished yet...March 16th a thunderstorm was traveling across the county producing rain and occasionally lightning. But then with no advance notice, suddenly we were under tornado warnings from the National Weather Service. Spotters quickly activated but again luck was with us and this circulation remained aloft.

Yet another SKYWARN activation was called for an unusual southward severe thunderstorm that essentially came down the coastline with a back door cold front and almost immediately after the passage of the front, northeaster conditions swept across the area.

The month of June brought a few more severe thunderstorm activations but it was July when things would really pick up.

The month of July was the busiest single month of SKYWARN activations in Flagler County Assist's

22 year history. Storm after storm came through, some spawning waterspouts, some bringing damaging winds. But the most notable one was on July 22nd.

Robbie Creal (*REACT* 30) the ARES SKYWARN Coordinator had been monitoring waterspouts developing just off shore Flagler Beach. Things had changed quickly on this quiet morning as tropical showers began to move onshore. Already other *REACT* members had reported funnel clouds well inland which prompted the SKYWARN activation and information to be relayed to the National Weather Service.

Then *REACT* 30 spotted a large waterspout that quickly dropped out of the sky and headed right for the shore. His report was relayed to Al Sandrik, Warning and Coordination Meteorologist at the National Weather Service in Jacksonville.

"It just hit the pier, we have debris in the air, there is debris in the air!" came REACT 30's report as he observed the now EF 0 tornado taking a path right through downtown Flagler Beach. The tornado was ripping off awnings, snapping power lines and throwing light objects high into the sky. Net Control Station staffed by Bob Pickering, RE-ACT 1 declared a SKYWARN Emergency and placed the net on LEVEL 4. Bob relayed real time info to the National Weather Service as the tornado made landfall and stormed through downtown Flagler Beach. Within 3 minutes REACT 30 and other units confirmed that the tornado was weakening rapidly and was retreating into the clouds. Never had REACT members so closely tracked an active tornado and provided real time info to the NWS. The tornado was confirmed EF 0 and only did minor damage. No storm related injuries were reported.

The rest of the year seemed to balance out with only two more severe thunderstorm activations in August and again in September.

Flagler County Assist *REACT* is very proud of its SKYWARN program and the close relationship the Team has with Emergency Management and the National Weather Service in Jacksonville. 2007 will not be forgotten by our members and we well know many other communities suffered much

more damage and loss than Flagler. But when the next storm comes, we know we are ready.

On April 21, 2008, it was the end of a workday for Oklahoma County REACT member Meredith Albrecht, a US Navy Pilot. As she was walking to her house she noticed a frantic neighbor across the street come running out of a house carrying 14 month old Emila Chadwick. Meredith ran across the street to find out what was going on. Emila's mother and grandmother were hysterical and Meredith had to take immediate action. Finding that Emila was not ing, Meredith's first aid and CPR training kicked in and by using back blows and a mouth sweep, she was able to get Emila breathing again. Meredith continued to maintain Emila's airway and monitor the situation until medical crews arrived. After the ambulance arrived it was determined that Emila had suffered a seizure. Emila is fine and suffered no ill effects from the seizure. Meredith was presented with the Navy's Achievement Medal for her action. A grateful family thanked Meredith for her actions.

San Angelo REACT

San Angelo Tex. - April 6, 2008 - This Sunday started out as most do around San Angelo (population 85,000). Then at 12:00 noon the phone rings and it is a Lt. with the San Angelo Police Dept. The City of San Angelo has 220 women and children coming from the YFZ-Ranch (home of the Fundamentalist Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints built by Warren Jeffs), and the Police Dept, Sheriff's Dept, Texas Dept of Public Safety are asked to secure the perimeter of Fort Concho (the 141 year old fort complex in San Angelo, that is the best restored frontier fort in Texas), from non-authorized pedestrian and vehicles from entering or leaving the area, and we need your help.

San Angelo *REACT* responded with 7 units, with 2 for relief during the day. Upon arriving at the Fort, *REACT* units started to assist and relieve police,

sheriff and DPS officers securing the perimeter from all pedestrian and vehicle traffic, so they could pursue other duties.



Bus loads of women and children started to arrive under police protection from Eldorado in the afternoon to start their stay at the Fort. Then came the flood of satellite and news vehicles from all over the country.

All law enforcement agencies in the area were on high alert, and the stress level of *REACT* members rose and fell as reports that members of the church might drive to San Angelo and attempt to make contact with the women and children.

Being volunteers, and having to return to our jobs the next day, at 10:00 P.M. officers from San Angelo Police Dept, San Angelo Lake and Park Police, and Department of Public Safety started to relieve *REACT* members so they could return home.

At the time of this article, the events are ongoing, and the man power and hours put in have not been totaled. But this is a unique experience for a small west Texas town.

- 1. **Call to Order.** Chairman Knott called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. and presented the agenda.
- **2. Establishment of Quorum**. Secretary Besing called the roll and determined that four Directors and three officers were present. Regions 4 and 9 being vacant, the Secretary declared that a quorum was established.
- **3. Minutes of Previous Meeting.** There being no changes or corrections, the minutes of the Special Meeting held 25 August 2007 were approved as written.

4. Officer Reports.

- a. Secretary Mr. Besing reported all recent minutes are posted the web site.
- b. Executive VP Mr. Greany advised he was willing to continue in his position at the Board's discretion.
- c. Treasurer Mr. Kaplan deferred until the budget discussion.
- d. President Mr. Cooper emphasized the need for regular financial reports from the Treasurer. He also stated that he would not accept another term as President.
- e. General Counsel Mr. Thompson reported no new legal problems.

5. Board Reports.

Region 1- Mr. Walters reported several new Teams and working on another; he is also working on the possibility of a multi-state drill with New York and Pennsylvania Councils.

Region 2 - Mr. Manlove reported gaining two new Teams but lost several Teams; is working on attracting new members for existing Teams. Region 3 - Mr. Knott said that membership retention is the focus of most Teams.

Region 4 - Vacant

Region 5 - Mr. Fry – absent, no report

Region 6 - Mr. Roberts absent, in a written report advised there are only 7 Teams in Region 6 with one in Oregon and Hawaii, two in Idaho, three in Washington, and none in Alaska, Montana, Wyoming, and the Pacific Islands (CNMI, Guam, American Samoa). The Pacific Northwest *REACT* Council has been dissolved and the assets will be distributed among the member Teams. He recommends realigning the regions and possibly merging one or more.

Region 7 - Mr. Kaster- absent, no report Region 8 - Mr. Toth - absent, no report Region 9 - Vacant

West Indies Envoy - Mr. Jagdeosingh absent, in a written report advised that the attempt of a ham radio operator in Trinidad to take over the Trinidad & Tobago *REACT* Council has been resolved. Two council meetings have been held recently in T&T; there are several major events pending, including an Olympic pre-qualifying event (boxing).

6. Reports of Board Committees.

- a. Finance Mr. Kaplan discussed cash flow problems caused by lower income from membership dues. Too many bounced checks has resulted in a policy requiring many payments to be by certified check or money order. Investments in certain stocks and bonds have not been cashed out to prevent actual losses. Mr. Kaplan noted that an item from the Annual Audit Report (Singleton & Bardowski, LLC CPA) recommending that one person not handle both income and expenditures could not be implemented in a one-person office (as noted by the auditors). Motion Mr. Manlove, 2d Mr. Cooper, to accept the report as presented. Motion passed.
- b. Office Review Mr. Manlove reported no changes needed. Office equipment has been upgraded by two new printers and an LCD flat screen monitor valued at \$414.13 donated by Richmond Metropolitan *REACT* Team #3968 (Va.).

c. Office Lease information - Mr. Kaplan is checking for lower rent within same building and neighboring areas. Current lease is for three years but can be terminated by RI prior to February 2009. However, the current lease is 35% lower than prevailing commercial rates.

7. Corporate Committee Reports.

- a. Awards & Recognition Mr. Cauley displayed a Radio Hero Award plaque and two radios to be awarded to a nine-year-old in Oregon and his father. (See minutes from August 2008 Special Board Meeting for details.) Cobra Radio donated a GMRS and a CB radio for the award.
- b. Computer Services Johnny Stowers (Calif.) and Mr. Besing presented a written report.
 - c. Convention & Site Selection Vacant
- d. Five Year Planning Mr. Cooper presented a written report. Office has resumed mailing "Team Topics." No major progress to report.
- e. Membership Development & Retention Vacant
- f. Publications Review Daughn O'Neill (Hawaii) submitted a written report. She will be unable to continue reviewing the *REACT*er because of publication time constraints.
- g. Public Relations Ron McCracken (Ont., Fla.) sent a written report. No press releases have been sent to news media. The *REACT*-List is being used to communicate to subscribers. "Pop-Comm" magazine continues to run ads for *REACT* on an exchange basis. Motion Mr. Walters, 2d Mr. Manlove, to authorize posting the *REACT* PSA on <www.youtube.com>. Motion passed.
- h. *REACT*er Don Tarbet (Me.). The Board discussed publication deadlines and the need to allow more time for official review prior to being sent to press. Mr. Tarbet's written report suggested possible changes in content or publication frequency. All issues are posted to the RI web site. Subscription via electronic instead of paper copy is encouraged. Discussion regarding changing publication to quarterly. Board asked staff to contact Valley Printing to see how quarterly publication would affect printing costs and postage charges. A report 2005 showed significant savings.

- i. Training & Development Tom Currie (Ky.) sent a written report.
- j. Ways & Means Mr. Cooper presented a written report.
- k. Team Management Handbook RevisionMr. Thompson reported some progress.
- **8. 2008 Budget.** Proposed budget was distributed. Discussion held about using on-line postage options. Mr. Kaplan stated that the postage meter contract expires in November 2008. Discussions held about applying for USPS nonprofit mail permit, use of credit card machine and services to reduce costs, staff's voluntary reduction in hours or pay during past year, and commissions paid for *REACT*er ads. Motion Mr. Manlove, 2d Mr. Cooper, to discontinue paying commissions. Motion passed. Motion Mr. Cooper, 2d Mr. Manlove, to adopt the proposed budget, as amended. Motion passed.
- **9. IRS Filings by Teams and Councils**. Mr. Kaplan mentioned the new electronic IRS Form 990-N most Teams and councils will have to file for 2007. If requested, RI is assisting with filing. Only three Teams have requested assistance so far.
- **10. Guest Presentation**. Bob Lumpkin (D.C.) and James Henderson (D.C.) (both of Federal City *REACT*, Inc.) discussed a concern over lack of conventions and need for regional conferences. Their Team is interested in hosting a regional conference near the D.C. area. Discussion held regarding need for NIMS training documentation to be on file with the RI Office for each Team member so that when requested, the office can provide a list of NIMS certified members. Federal City *REACT* will need manpower assistance for January 2009 Presidential inaugural, in support of the District of Columbia emergency management office. Article will be written for *REACT* er.

11. Regional Problems.

a. Ohio Council – Mr. Manlove has met with council leaders to resolve the council's suspension. The council has submitted minutes for the period requested and re-elected council officers. Motion Mr. Cooper, 2d Mr. Manlove, that

- when determined that the Ohio State *REACT* Council has complied with Board requirements, the council be reinstated to "good standing." Motion passed.
- b. Utah judgment Mr. Thompson said that nothing further had been heard.
- c. *REACT* Australia, Inc. Mr. Kaplan reported contact from a 900-member group in Murray Bridge, South Australia, purporting to be affiliated with *REACT* International and asked the Board for guidance.
- **12. Region 6 Realignment.** Mr. Roberts has proposed this region be realigned. Discussion held about need to realign all regions because of changes in number of Teams and Members. Tabled to the Summer meeting.
- 13. Team Renewals. Mr. Kaplan distributed a comparison between 2007 and 2008. Top four reasons for non-renewal of members is (1) deceased, (2) relocated to area without a Team, (3) lost interest, usually because of low activity levels by Team, (4) no longer "compatible" with Team. He said non-renewed members should be tracked and efforts made to retain them. The dues structure and possible decrease in US and Canada family and junior class dues was discussed.
- **14. Plaques for Past Directors.** Mr. Cooper asked for a budget authorization.
- **15. General Liability Insurance**. Mr. Kaplan reported that the general liability insurance premium cost does not appear to have caused any Team to drop out. Renewal premium for 2009 won't be known until 2008 registration is completed.
- **16. Personal and Legal Matters**. The meeting was closed (only officers and Directors attending). Staff has proposed that office hours be changed May through September, to be open Tuesday through Thursday. Phone and email messages will checked (remotely) on Mondays, Fridays, and weekends. This voluntary action will reduce payroll by 40% to aid the budget. Motion Mr. Cooper, 2d Mr. Manlove, to accept offer, with appreciation. Motion passed. Meeting reopened.

- **17. National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disasters (NVOAD).** Mr. Kaplan advised that NVOAD has changed the membership structure to two tiers, based on the organization's annual budget, Class 1 being \$15 million and above and Class 2 being \$3 million or above (or more than 300 total staff and members, which includes *RE-ACT* International). Existing member organizations with lower annual budgets will be grandfathered for some period of time.
- **18. Team Topics.** The last Team Topics was mailed in February future schedule calls for mailings in the months between *REACT*er mailings.
- **19. Donations Policy.** Mr. Thompson said the policy was still under development. He discussed differences between accepting restricted/designated or unrestricted donation, and handling of donated funds.

The meeting was recessed at 4 p.m. until 9 a.m. Saturday.

Reconvened at 9:10 a.m., Saturday by the Chairman; no change in attendance.

20. Future of *REACT***.** Mr. Cooper opened a lengthy discussion concerning ideas for revitalizing *REACT*. Detailed notes were kept in a separate report and forwarded to the Five Year Planning Committee for possible implementation, *REACT*er articles, etc. He asked other Directors to help focus with one or more committees to get them kick started.

21. Election and Appointment of Officers.

- a. President. Mr. Cooper nominated Mr. Manlove. There were no other nominations and the Chairman declared Mr. Manlove elected for a two-year term.
- b. Executive Vice President. Mr. Manlove nominated Mr. Greany. There were no other nominations and the Chairman declared Mr. Greany reelected for a one-year term.
- c. Treasurer. Mr. Cooper nominated Mr. Kaplan. There were no other nominations and the

Chairman declared Mr. Kaplan reelected for a one-year term.

- d. Secretary. Mr. Cooper nominated Mr. Besing. There were no other nominations and the Chairman declared Mr. Besing reelected for a one-year term.
- e. Assistant Secretary. Mr. Cooper moved for reappointment of Mr. Kaplan for a one-year term, 2d Mr. Manlove. Motion passed.
- f. General Counsel. Mr. Cooper moved for reappointment of Mr. Thompson for a one-year term, 2d Mr. Manlove. Motion passed.
- **22.** Election of Chairman, Vice Chairman. Mr. Cooper assumed the chair and conducted the elections.
- a. Chairman. Mr. Manlove nominated Mr. Knott. There were no other nominations and Mr. Cooper declared Mr. Knott reelected for a one-year term.
- b. Vice Chairman. Mr. Manlove nominated Mr. Walters. There were no other nominations and Mr. Cooper declared Mr. Walters elected for a one-year term.

23. Dates for Upcoming Meetings.

- a. Spring Special Meeting. The Board discussed holding a Spring electronic Board meeting. Motion Mr. Cooper, 2d Mr. Manlove, to hold meeting on Saturday, 7 June 2008, at 3 p.m. EST. Motion passed.
- b. Summer Special Meeting. It was proposed to have the usual Summer meeting electronically to save travel costs. Motion Mr. Cooper, 2d Mr. Manlove, to hold electronic meeting on Saturday, 9 August 2008, at 3 p.m. EST. Motion passed.
- c. Special Fall Meeting. The Board discussed holding a Fall electronic Board meeting. Motion Mr. Cooper, 2d Mr. Manlove, to hold meeting on Saturday, 15 November 2008, at 3 p.m. EST. Motion passed.

It was moved and seconded to adjourn the meeting. Unanimous.

Meeting adjourned at 3:25 p.m., Saturday, 8 March 2008, sine die.

CANWARN in CANADA.

"CANWARN" Stands for CANADIAN WEATHER AMATEUR RADIO NETWORK. Yes we do have Severe Weather in Canada!! Were not just Snow! This spring was a busy one for the training for our Canadian Spotters in the Ontario Region organized by Ward Kennedy DON VALLEY *REACT* TEAM 4866 Unit #11 VE3WGK Canwarn Net control Central Ontario.

The 2007 season itself was an interesting one with 9 confirmed or probable tornadoes just two fewer than the long term average of 11 in Ontario. Of note was that 5 of these tornadoes were associated with a massive supercell thunderstorm that moved through portions of Grey, Bruce, Huron, Perth and Waterloo-Wellington counties on July 8th, 2007. In addition to spawning a number of tornadoes, large hail was reported with this event as well. Fortunately, no major structural damage was done from this impressive storm. Also interesting was that all of the tornadoes last year were ranked at the lowest end of the Fujita damage scale...as either an F0 (winds up to 115 km/h) or F1 (winds between 120 and 170 km/h). We continue to be

long overdue for an F3 or larger tornado with the last F3 being confirmed in the Violet Hill area in April of 1996.

2007 also reminded us than anywhere in the Province can experience severe thunderstorms and tornadoes with a damaging wind event occurring in Northwestern Ontario in the Ignace area on the morning of June 26th, a confirmed F1 tornado occurring later that same day about 60 km to the west of Thunder Bay and a damaging wind event taking place on August 1st at the Kashechewan First Nation near James Bay.

New faces are always sought at our training sessions, but we are also anxious to update the training of those who haven't attended a session in awhile.

You Deserve It

Publicity. Is your Team getting all the good publicity it deserves?

Remember to include Don Tarbet, editor of The *REACT*er each time your Team issues a media release. Include me, too, so I can try to give your Team coverage in our bi-monthly '*REACT* in Action' column in *Popular Communications* magazine.

E-mail makes PR so much easier these days. Once your release is ready, you can enter all the addresses you wish, click SEND, and it is on the way. Each additional address increases your chances of coverage. Send to *all* media outlets in your town. That is a sure way to earn media friends.

Someone on your Team almost certainly has e-mail. If your Team PR officer has e-mail, so much the better, but someone else can help out by e-mailing releases he prepares. Take advantage of all the skills you have in your Team to get the word out about the good work you are doing.

New to PR? Pick the brain of the person you are replacing. Ask for copies of some of the Team's earlier releases. Use those as a guide. Head for your library and ask for an easy book on PR. It will include some model media releases. Follow the format shown *very closely*. It works. It is what the media expect your Team's releases to look like.

Good photos give your releases an advantage. They need to show people *doing* something, not just standing in a neat line. Your subject can be talking on a radio, or helping someone. He can be studying a map with a police officer. He should always be in Team uniform, with *REACT* logo or I.D. clearly visible. Vehicles should display magnetic *REACT* signs. Zero in on your subject as closely as you can. Again, e-mail makes it easier to send photos.

Snail mail still works, too. Any PR book will tell you that all your releases should be typed, double space. Again, someone can help you with that. You can mail me at: 765 Scotty Drive, Titusville,
