

VIRTUAL TRAINING: AMATEUR RADIO TECHNICIAN CLASS


In the June 2020 issue of The *REACT*er, we advocated for using virtual technologies to facilitate the meeting and training requirements of *REACT* Teams, given the restrictions associated with the COVID-19 pandemic situation. It was also noted that training programs were being scheduled in the coming months and a registration page was created for persons to express their interest in the various courses.



One of the programs undertaken was the Amateur Radio – Technician Class - Virtual Training programme. Sixteen (16) sessions were held, comprising of 1- hour sessions each week. The first session was held on 29th June 2020, and the last class was held on the 18th September 2020. The sessions were exam-focused, touching on the relevant theories to facilitate an understanding of the concepts. All 424 questions in the pool were reviewed. A Certificate of Participation will be issued to persons with an attendance of 75% or more. Congratulations to all participants for staying the course.

Classes were produced using the Zoom platform, and there were over sixty (60) participants in the course. The training resources and other supplemental material were made available electronically. All sessions held via the live Zoom webinar were simultaneously streamed live via YouTube to cater for any overflow with the Zoom licence. The YouTube recordings were also saved so that participants who would have missed any classes due to clashes or Internet issues would not miss out and have the opportunity to review.

The recordings are available for anyone who would like to pursue the training on-demand and at their convenience. If there are time constraints, it is possible to playback a bit,



stop, and return to continue. The current Technician Class question pool is valid for the period 2018 – 2022, so the content will be valid for quite some time and is available to anyone with access to YouTube. A link to the Playlist with all sixteen (16) sessions can be found at http://tech.ttreact.com/

Obtaining an amateur radio licence is highly recommended. Examinations are also held by the various Volunteer Examiners (VEs), the largest VEC being the ARRL. Online exam sessions were authorized by the FCC back in April 2020. A schedule of sessions are available at the site https://hamstudy.org/sessions.

REACT International, Inc. has a wealth of online courses available for download at https://reactintl.org/training/. Exams can also be undertaken to obtain certification.

Further virtual training sessions are to be scheduled based on the training needs analysis and expression of interest from Teams and their members. While in-person, instructor-led sessions are necessary in some cases, much of the training required by *REACT*ers can be facilitated using the virtual platform.

Now is a good time to get all of your outstanding training accomplished, and have fun doing so!



San Angelo REACT

On the 22nd of August, seven members of San Angelo *REACT* were busy assisting local authorities on Knickerbocker Road in San Angelo TX following a 'rogue' storm that did a lot of damage. The Team was activated at approximately 2 pm CDT and remained on the scene until 2 pm CDT the next day.



The San Angelo Fire Department reported Engine 3 was disabled on the loop by downed power lines. There were calls of collapsed buildings as well.

Police responded to the Bellagio Apartments on Sweetbriar and found a heavily damaged roof but no collapse. Firefighters responded to a structure fire in the 4100 block of Village East near Sitel.

The report was for active flames coming from the building.

No reports of injuries so far.

Police responded to a crash call on N. Chadbourne St. at the Window Depot building across from the Concho Valley Transit depot. Reports indicate one vehicle may have hit another vehicle driving it into the building.

The first vehicle was stopped along loop 306, several blocks away. Reports indicate a teenage female was injured and an ambulance was called.

Team members helped with traffic control and communications while local personnel cleaned up the area.

Hill Country REACT

While on my way home last Sunday evening (9/13/20) and admiring the sunset glaring in my eyes, I noticed a traffic jam developing as I approached McCullough Ave, westbound on

Loop 410 in San Antonio. After crossing under the overpass, it became apparent that we had a vehicle fire in progress, in the center lane up ahead.



I immediately called the San Antonio Police Department's non-emergency line (because I had it on speed dial and it was quicker). The operator confirmed they had already dispatched both police and fire to the scene. I also turned on my Amber & white strobe lights, both front and rear, and then parked behind the burning car, about 300 feet back from it.

Being a trained member of the Hill Country *REACT* Radio Team, I had the needed traffic safety gear with me in my vehicle. I put my reflective traffic vest on, grabbed my red LED traffic wand, and then coordinated with another volunteer on the scene, a soldier with the US Army Reserve who had spotted the fire while driving east on Loop 410.

We started directing traffic over to the left lane, trying to clear the scene for the soon to be arriving police cars and fire trucks. Within a couple of minutes, we had the traffic completely under control, making it easier for police and fire to get to the scene. The first two SAPD officers to arrive, happened to both be female. They coordinated with each other and us, then took control of the traffic scene.

When the firetruck arrived, they shut down all westbound traffic to make the scene safer for the firemen to put out the fire.

- Build-a-Bears are particularly popular with children!


Southeast Louisiana REACT

Trinidad & Tobago help with the General Election

On Monday, 10th August 2020, the General Elections was held in the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago. REACT has been assisting in providing radio communications for several decades in respect of elections, whether Local Government or General Elections.

During the polling day, REACT was called upon by the Office of Disaster Preparedness and Management (ODPM) to monitor all areas and provide situation reports (sitreps) throughout the day. The initiative was led by Rohan Rampersad, President of Team 6005, with several members of Teams supporting the effort. Information was obtained and collated via the radio systems and submitted to the ODPM using electronic means. Some of the information included observations by location and time, and were based on gatherings, traffic, and weather. REACTers were out from early in the morning up until the close of the poll at 6 pm.

During the count when ballots were tallied, REACT members were stationed at various returning officer's locations, party headquarters, and media house TV6. The project was led by Kenny Jagdeosingh, President of Team 2496, and Anwar Mondol, President of Team 6007. Members from several Teams participated, including 2496, 4928, 6006, 6007, 6008, and 6045.

Some locations required equipment and antenna installations, so site visits were made on the days prior to polling day. These visits also allowed for logistics to be tweaked and any potential issues such as access to be ironed out. Picture passes and letters of authorization were issued by TV6 to all persons in order to gain access to the restricted areas. The safety of REACTers was of the utmost importance.

Information on a real-time basis was passed on the voting count by polling divisions using the REACT radio system and other means. REACTers would have been on-site from as early as 4 pm and stayed at their assigned locations until after 11 pm in some cases.

Congratulations to all *REACT*ers on a successful project!



Training for the Future

Three *REACT* courses were successfully completed, congratulations to the members who are increasing their emergency response skills. Several *REACT* traffic handlers participated in a joint Satern and Mars HF net.

An Auxiliary Communications (AuxComm) workshop group all day zoom meeting was conducted in Michigan. Just in case you wonder what AuxComm is, it consists of representatives from the volunteer radio community, law enforcement and emergency management representaives. AuxComm groups in the state address local and statewide development of volunteer radio capabilities, AuxComm credentialed radio operators can help staff Regional, State and Local Emergency Operations Centers. The AuxComm organization is also open to non-radio subject matter experts such as data, voice, video, microwave, or satellite experts.

Training - What's Coming Up

U.S. Army MARS may be sending Radiogram or ICS-213 messages into the traffic system in advance of a planned interoperability exercise (the date is be determined) this will be conducted in cooperation with RRI. Radio Relay International Fourth Quarter Emergency Communications Exercise will be built around weather data reporting. The exercise takes place in two phases part one is scheduled for September 15 and September 19. The simulation will be for a Gulf Coast hurricane and New England Hurricane respectively. Part Two of the exercise will take place at a date yet to be determined in November. That simulation will be a major winter storm impacting the Upper Midwest. The Use of Prowords in Radio Communications

Last month my article was primarily about ITU phonetics. This month will be Prowords. Prowords (Procedure Words) are meant to keep voice transmission as short and clear as possible, radio operators use procedure

words (PROWORDs) to take the place of long sentences. At the end of this article there is a table with many prowords some of them I would not anticipate a *REACT* member would ever use.

When sending formal traffic, certain Procedure Words (prowords) are used to clarify portions of the message. The standard prowords for *REACT* Teams are:

BREAK - Separates address from text and text from signature.

CORRECTION - I'm going to correct an error.

END - End of message.

MORE - More messages to follow.

NO MORE - No more messages to follow.

FIGURES - Used for a word group consisting of all numbers.

INITIAL - Used only for a single initial.

I SAY AGAIN - Used to indicate a 'repeat' of a word.

I SPELL - To spell [phonetically] a word.

LETTER GROUP - Examples: ARES, SCTN, NTS, RRI

MIXED GROUP - Examples: 12BA6, 7/23, 9/3/BOOKS, NNNØSBK

When receiving formal traffic, certain prowords are used to ask for clarification or

repeats of missing words.

SAY AGAIN,

WORD AFTER

WORD BEFORE

BETWEEN

ALL AFTER

ALL BEFORE

When you complete an exchange with another station, use the prowords "Over" "clear" or

"out" so other stations will know the frequency is now available to them. One method

is to end with just your call. This fulfills all the FCC

identification requirements and

takes less time. Whatever procedure your Team uses, make sure everyone knows and uses the same procedure.

Now to muddy the water a little, are pro-words and phonetics considered compliant with ICS/NIMS guidelines plain language radio procedures? My research has found that the US Coast Guard and the Civil Air Patrol have determined that prowords and ITU Phonetics are compliant with the National Incident Management System. MARS uses prowords in there training material and there is indication from unconfirmed sources that as of 2018 that FEMA SHARES will be incorporating or considering the use of prowords as plain language communications.

The use of 10 Codes and other communications shortcuts. After volunteering in a number of EMS, Rescue and Fire roles throughout the south while in the military, it seemed as though every location had their own list of 10 codes and some were the same wherever I went, for instance 10-7 (out of service). When some are different it can cause confusion and even have life safety impacts. Because each team serves the community they live in, it is important to know how law enforcement, EMS and fire communicate. You should be knowledgeable on the 10 codes or other methods they use for radio communications. However, *REACT* team members should become proficient with ITU phonetics and the common prowords, that are in our training materials. The reason for this is to be compliant with NIMS and Incident Command System (ICS). If you have a Amateur Radio license you have probably heard of AUXCOMM. If any *REACT* radio communicator wants to be credentialed as an AUXCOMM operator, standard ITU phonetics and prowords are basic to becoming credentialed.

Please let the training committee know what you think about the use of standard phonetics, prowords and 10 Codes, it is my plan ask the Board of Directors to consider a resolution for the use of standard ITU phonetics and common accepted prowords for use in the *REACT* organization. Setting Up a Station in 10 Minutes or Less

So you want to set up a station in ten minutes or less. Well, here is one idea.

On one side of the back pack I have a multi-meter. The other side pocket contains two bottles of water. The main rear pocket contains paper and writing implements, meter leads, antenna adapters, an extra handheld radio battery, and band aids. I have a small flashlight attached to the zipper tab.



This leaves the backpack weighing just under 20 pounds (17.8#) total. The main backpack holds a small "lunch" type pack (Figure 2)

along with a cartridge drive carrier (Figure 3),

In the smaller pack, I have bungees, Anderson cables, connector adapters, an emergency backup, dual-band flexible J-Pole antenna. I also have an earbud/mike for my handheld along with a blue-tooth setup and handheld pouch.

I had a cartridge recorder for computer



backup years ago. I got rid of the cartridge drive and kept the transport carrier. It houses a battery, mobile radio, and some accessories, like a radio manual and a Watt's Up.

Once the

battery is charged I store this with everything disconnected. This helps assure that the battery does not discharge prematurely. I try to use this station every six month or so to ensure it remains in working order.

I have used this on drills and exercises for 6-10 hours without any problems. Is this good for a long-term Net Control? Probably not as it is, however, with someone bringing in a fresh battery every few hours, and perhaps anchoring the antenna, if there is sufficient wind, then yes. If the radio operator is comfortable then you should be good to stay on the air for the duration. There is certainly more good emergency supplies that could be included, but this is intended for a very quick emergency setup.

Hope this helps someone or creates some ideas to expand upon. Whatever work for you will get you through an emergency. Stay prepared and stay safe!

And then the Antenna...


Okay, you've opened up the packs and have the radio ready to go. Before you turn the radio ON, here's the antenna setup to make sure you will be getting your signal out.

Figures 1 and 2 show how I store and transport the an-









If you look close at the lower portion of the picture, you may notice a red band around one leg of the stand. This is where the dual band antenna is stored. (SUNDELY Dual Band Telescopic Extendable Whip Antenna, model 122-264HY from Amazon)

The antenna adapter and cable are secured to the end of the boom. Take the cap off the leg, retrieve the antenna, screw onto the adapter and assemble the boom.

Figure 4, you may notice my assistant is taking a break. You may raise it as high as practical.



Region 6 Manager Tom Jenkins recalls Ed working his first Sawtooth Relay in 2000. Three operators helped 300 teams (of 6 members each) run relays down Idaho Highway 75 from Stanley to Ketchum.

At the age of 90, Ed decided to hang up his bicycle and handheld. He attended 90% of the traffic control events downtown as bicycle mobile. *REACT* International President John Capodanno presented a plaque to Ed in 2014 as reported in the *REACT* magazine. Sgt Kyle Christensen presented a recognition plaque from the Boise Police Department.

ride. During his final months, I got the sense he had come to terms with his timing and the simple unavoidable reality that everything comes to an end (in the natural order).




