

Amateur Radio Training-Become A Licensed Ham

Technician & General Class Sessions Available On-Demand



The COVID-19 pandemic has brought immense challenges but has also presented opportunities. One such opportunity is training. Many of us would have gone through, and may still be going through, periods of "lockdown" where movements are restricted in an effort to reduce the spread of the virus and to keep the health systems from becoming overwhelmed. Persons could suddenly make productive use of this extra time to take training courses.

While it would have been traditional to have in-person training sessions, an increase in the adoption of virtual training has been observed since 2020. There has been a strong demand for Amateur (Ham) Radio training. However, gathering in a classroom was severely curtailed. As such, *REACT* took to the Zoom/YouTube platforms to deliver the content necessary to prepare candidates to take the license exams. The curriculum is based on the FCC system in the US but also applies to several other territories that have exams based on the FCC syllabus.

Last year2020, the Technician Class level was completed and is available on-demand at the link http://tech.ttreact.com/. Sixteen (16) 1-hour sessions were delivered and streamed/recorded for future playback/revision. The approach taken is to lightly touch on the theory for each topic, with an exam focus. All questions in the question pool are tackled. Additionally, persons who missed the opportunity only need to view the recordings, stop and resume, at their convenience. The question pool is good until 2022. All handouts, including slides, are also available for download. The videos can even be viewed on a Smart TV via the YouTube app.

Last month, September 2021, we concluded the General Class level. Certificates of participation are issued to personsthat have attended at least 75% of the sessions. The complete course, comprising twenty-four (24) 1-hour sessions, is now available in a playlist at the link http://gen.ttreact.com/. The General Class question pool is



The courses, while targeted at persons who are interested in obtaining their Amateur Radio license, can be of benefit to any radio operator. So we encourage everyone to consider having a look at the sessions.

There are plans to do the Extra Class level in the coming months, so stay tuned for the announcement. Also, remember the *REACT* Training Department offers at least seventeen (17) courses with certification via the website https://reactintl.org/training/. Training is key to developing our capabilities as *REACT* ers.

The *React* International Traffic System Part 1

If you were to interview successful leaders in Fire, Emergency Medical Services, Law Enforcement, or the military. I would venture to say that effective communications becomes the second most important function next to well trained personnel in their area of expertise.

In the case of *REACT* whose roots are in communications, there is no other organization whose primary mission, is to provide communications services to the public and local public safety. Most successful teams have this role in their communities by providing other value added services. Given the incredible advances in personal communications, successful teams have honed in on an expanded role to ensure their long term viability in providing a multitude of services. Communication technologies is only one of the tools teams can utilize to further support the needs of their communities.

REACT Traffic System History and REACT International Partnerships

The *REACT* Traffic System was officially established as a branch of *REACT* International Headquarters in 2017 whose function is to manage all aspects of communications and information systems support for *REACT* International. The traffic system is not a team but is *REACT*'s premier large-scale communications special operations force, and it is made up of some of the most elite *REACT* members from teams around the world. The Traffic System members specialize in joint communications special operations with *REACT* Teams, local public service, state and federal organizations. We also support a number of organizations through both formal and informal memorandums of understanding. These organization include the ARC, ARRL, NTS, RRI NWS/NOAA, SATERN, National Hurricane Net, FEMA, DHS, SAFECOM, and Civil Air Patrol.

REACT Traffic System Mission

The mission of *REACT* International Traffic System is to support emergency communication and coordination between *REACT* Teams, *REACT* International headquarters, and supported emergency response and relief organizations by:

• Operating a traffic handling system to receive, transmit, and deliver formal messages in standard formats to support disaster communications.

- Supporting training for *REACT* members in disaster messaging through use of the traffic handling system.
- Providing alerting and warning messages to and receive situation reports from REACT
 Teams during disaster exercises and actual major emergencies and disasters.
- Operating alternate communications pathways in disasters for supported organizations.

Common Operating Picture

In order for the Traffic System to accomplish its mission requires a number of interrelated functions. That begins with building a Common Operating Picture using flexible communications and information systems. That allow all teams, served agencies, emergency management and response partners to establish and maintain a common operating picture or overview of the incidents as they become a threat the community. Establishing and maintaining a common operating picture requires gathering, collating information such as traffic, weather, actual damage, resource availability of any type (voice, data, etc.) from agencies/organizations in order to support decision-making.

In order to assist in establishing a Common Operating Picture in order to mitigate real and potential risks, the traffic system focuses on these components, this is not a complete list

- Interoperability: Ensuring that emergency management/response personnel and their affiliated organizations can communicate within and across agencies and jurisdictions.
- Common Terminology: Using common terminology or plain English to avoid confusion or misunderstandings.
- Mutual Aid and Assistance Agreements: Using specified communication protocols and information-sharing arrangements in mutual aid and assistance agreements.
- Exercising: Establishing partnerships and testing communications protocols scheduled prior to the incident so when the actual incident occurs everyone is comfortable and prepared.

Next month in part 2, the article will focus on *REACT* Traffic System routine daily operations, pre-event operations, response operations and potential recovery operations as they pertain to support, *REACT* Teams, supported agencies and the public.

Public Service through Communications

On September 18, 2021 in Concord, Massachusetts, 282 cyclists rode 20 miles to raise \$355,402 to raise awareness of Multiple Sclerosis (MS) and to fund patient support, programs, resources, library & education programs and funding research to find a cure. Southeastern, Ma *REACT* Team #6240 supported the ride with our member owned trailer, Mobile Auxiliary Communication Center and APRS trackers.



MS is a disease in which the immune system eats away at the protective covering of nerves. In MS, resulting nerve damage disrupts communication between the brain and the body. Multiple sclerosis causes many different symptoms, including vision loss, pain, fatigue, and impaired coordination. The symptoms, severity, and duration can vary from person to person. Some people may be symptom free most of their lives, while others can have severe chronic symptoms that never go away. Physical therapy and medications that suppress the immune system can help with symptoms and slow disease progression.

Cyclists rode back in time as they cycled through the colonial suburbs of our nation's history, riding by the North Bridge located at a brick mansion built in 1911 by descendants of the Buttrick family. Major John Buttrick was the colonial officer who first ordered his militia to fire upon British soldiers. A brass cannon, dubbed "The Hancock" in celebration of its storied past. In 1775, this cannon, recently smuggled out of Boston, was one of four brass cannons hidden in Concord and its recovery was one of General Gage's chief motives when he sent British troops to Concord on April 19, 1775. It is one display courtesy of the Bunker Hill Monument Association.



The American Flag is always with us and proudly flown to thank one and all, past, present and future, service members and their families for their sacrifices.

The Mobile Auxiliary Communication Center was set up at the Concord-Carlisle High School which served as the ride start finish. The MACC served as the Operations Center with an MS Society staff member, as well as serving as Net Control on two amateur radio repeaters and APRS tracking of route support vehicles.

The Diamond x50A is dual-band base/repeater antenna that stows away easily at only five foot 6 inches. This gives us medium gain on 144 MHz with 4.5db and on 440 MHz with 7.2db and will handle 200 watts. All sitting on top of twenty-five feet of mast. The RG8U cable connects to UHF bulkhead connectors. We use low loss jumpers to the radio(s) we plan to use with the base antenna versus the roof mounted antennas.

COVID-19 had a considerable effect on event planning and execution details. Pre-Event health screening of all staff, participants, and volunteers. Cyclists must bring their own water bottles. Individual water bottles will be available for refills. Reduced touch points to minimize physical interactions. Hand sanitizer was available throughout the event including packet pickup locations, higher traffic areas, and in and around portable toilets.

Face coverings were required for all riders, volunteers, and staff throughout the event regardless of vaccination status for COVID-19, riders were allowed to remove their masks when out on the road, eating, or drinking. Event signage to promote safe social distancing practices including maintaining 6 feet of distance or more between others. Dedicated lanes and waiting spots were provided as an aid in physical distancing in areas where cyclists congregate such as packet pick-up, start line, and restrooms based on local guidelines. Anyone at increased risk or exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19 was directed to stay home.

Both the 25 miles and 60 miles routes included fully-stocked rest stops every 10 to 12 miles with some of the best snacks and communications volunteers around. Members served as route support and guidance (SAG) using our own vehicles and equipment, provided rest stop communications and tracked key assets with the APRS (Automatic Packet Reporting System) trackers. We not only supported the ride, members went the extra mile to help staff, participants, and volunteers by getting ice, fix a flat tire and providing transportation back to the high school because the riders could not finish.



Thanks to our Team Vice President Jim Bradley, KB1JKJ, who created the route overlay that was imported into aprs.fi so we could follow the six APRS trackers running. This was especially handy to identify the closest route support vehicle to an incident between a cyclist and a vehicle. There were no injuries, just angry people who had to be reminded by the police officer to share the road.

There is enough space for three operators comfortably, a fourth would be doable. The racks house a 2 meter and 220 amateur repeater, one UHF mobile repeater, 60 amp power supply, rack mounted power stations, back up batteries and wireless printer. The 40 inch monitor to track APRS and weather radar or a status board on a split screen. The radios are usually mounted to the shelves, but we are in the process of updating radios, connections, adding a closet and storage bench seat to help our storage needs.



One of the most important aspects of any event is good planning of every aspect of the event. We always dedicate a route support vehicle to sweep the route, follow the last cyclist to help ensure nobody is left out on the route with a flat, broken chain or something worse. This is usually a very long drawn out day if you stuck doing the entire route all day. Some NCS operators do plan that way, some break it up between each rest stop to allow bio-breaks, eat or just relax for a while. Many radio operators sitting at a rest stop may want to drive for a while if not heading out for the wife's list. Changing task's helps keep volunteers from getting board, keep them moving and interested in the event.

There is so much more to providing route support than driving around with lights flashing all over the place. Emergency Warning lights are intended to indicate a road hazard, a dangerous situation may exist that should tell drivers on the road to slow down in case they have to suddenly stop. We always discourage members from driving with their Emergency Warning lights flashing all the time while driving around because it tends to confuse and desensitize the motorists around you. When motorists are not paying attention to the lights any longer, they stop driving as cautiously, until you slam on your brakes to help someone, risking the possibility of causing an accident. Driving with care and leaving the use of your Emergency Warning lights for when you need to warn the public about a dangerous or hazardous situation. Remember, everyone around you needs time to *REACT*.


South Central Kansas REACT Providing Security
